2024 Voter Guide

Save the Dates!

Feb. 20

Last day to register online to vote and get a mail-in ballot (after this date, you can still register to vote in person at any vote center)

Feb. 24

Vote centers open for in-person voting. Find a vote center at LAVote.gov

March 5

Last day to vote in person, drop your mail-in ballot in a ballot box, or postmark your mail-in ballot

Proposition 1

Proposition 1 would authorize 6.38 billion in bond funding for the purposes of building more mental health treatment facilities for individuals facing mental health and substance use challenges. Proposition 1 will also modify existing guidelines set forth in Proposition 63: Mental Health Services Act (MHSA) by requiring counties to shift funding from mental health care and drug or alcohol treatment service and focus more on housing and personalized support services.

Yes Vote: A Yes Vote means that you authorize the State of California to raise 6.38 billion in bond funding and approve of changes to the MHSA that will require counties to focus funding toward housing and personalized support services.

No Vote: A No Vote means that you do not want the State of California to raise 6.38 billion in bond funding and keep the existing ability for counties to allocate MHSA funds at the county level.

Measure HLA



Rising Communities Recommends a Yes Vote

Measure HLA would require the City of Los Angeles to implement the City's adopted Mobility Plan by re-striping when repaving the street. The Measure will also require the City of Los Angeles to create an open data portal that tracks the progress of the Mobility Plan implementation. Residents of the city will be able to sue the City of Los Angeles if the City does not follow the mandates set by Measure HLA.

Yes Vote: A Yes Vote means that you want to require the City of Los Angeles to implement the City's adopted Mobility Plan when the City repaves the street.

No Vote: A No Vote means that you do NOT want to require the City of Los Angeles to implement the City's adopted Mobility Plan when the City repaves the street. Instead, you would like the City of Los Angeles to keep its existing pace and efforts on the Mobility Plan.

Notice:

All California active registered voters will receive a vote-by-mail ballot for the March 5, 2024, Presidential Primary Election.

Vote-by-mail ballots can be returned by mail, at a drop-off location, or your county elections office.

Presidential Candidate Guide

The primary election is about choosing a party's presidential candidate.

You want to vote in the Republican, Green or Peace and Freedom primary?

The only way to vote for any of these presidential candidates in the primary is to register with one of the parties. You will have to re-register to vote to change parties.

You want to vote in the Democratic, Libertarian or American Independent primary?

“No Party Preference” voters are allowed to vote for a presidential candidate for any one of these parties. But in order to do so, you have to request what’s called a “crossover ballot.” Just pick which party’s primary you want to participate in, and you’ll get a ballot with their candidates on it.
